“Everybody is just totally, totally freaked out and shaken,” Henry Bahn, an official of the United States Department of Agriculture who was visiting Haiti, told The Associated Press. “The sky is just gray with dust.”

Haiti já pobre Haiti’s many man-made woes — its dire poverty, political infighting and proclivity for insurrection — have been exacerbated repeatedly by natural disasters. At the end of 2008, four hurricanes flooded whole towns, knocked out bridges and left a destitute population in even more desperate conditions.

The United States and other countries have devoted significant humanitarian support to Haiti, financing a large United Nations peacekeeping mission that has recently reported major gains in controlling crime. International aid has also supported an array of organizations aimed at raising the country’s dismal health and education levels.

The house started shaking. Then it really started shaking. I walked out of my room and kneeled slowly to the undulating floor, laptop in hand, as windows, two years’ worth of Haitian art and a picture of my grandfather smashed around me.

I was not hurt. Not only that, the staircase in the house where I live and work, while completely invisible behind a choking white cloud of drywall and dust, was still standing. I yelled out for Evens, the AP’s all-in-one driver/translator/bodyguard here.

To my shock and delight he answered: “Let’s go.”

I went. Barefoot, over rocks, past a crack running the height of the house, out to the street in my underwear, first to look for a telephone to call in what had happened, then brave any aftershocks and return to the house for a chance at shoes and pants.

Eventually, I went to the school and started working to pull trapped students from the wreckage.”

“People are feeling hopeless but also demanding that the United Nations and others provide help and it is an open question how patient they will be as the logistics are worked out. “They are slowly getting more angry,” said David Winhurst, the spokesman for the United Nations mission, although the start of food and water distribution on Thursday should help answer some of the needs of some of the poorest who lack all food, water and shelter. “We are all aware of the fact that the situation is getting more tense,” he said.”

Oxfam “I have seen wounded people flooding into the hospitals and buildings of several stories high that are now totally flat. Several thousands have probably died in the quake, but it will take time to get a full picture. Bodies may stay under the rubble for a long time because it is difficult to access some sites, and heavy lifting equipment is in limited supply.”

Frederik Dupoux “I witnessed a few men digging out a 3 month old baby from a house alive with no medical help around.”

Ajuda internacional “France has suspended expelling illegal immigrants from Haiti in the wake of the massive earthquake there, the country’s immigration minister said Thursday. France will instead temporarily allow earthquake victims who need medical assistance into the country, Eric Besson said in a statement.”

“[Reuters reports](#) that the “United States was sending 3,500 soldiers and 300 medical personnel to help with disaster relief and security in the devastated Caribbean capital, with the first of those scheduled to arrive on Thursday. The Pentagon was also sending an aircraft carrier and three amphibious ships, including one that can carry up to 2,000 Marines”

Balanço “The Haitian Red Cross said it believed 45,000 to 50,000 people had died and 3 million more were hurt or left homeless by the major 7.0 magnitude quake that hit Haiti’s capital on Tuesday. Many people were believed to be still trapped alive in the rubble”

“Money is worth nothing right now, water is the currency,” one foreign aid-worker told Reuters.

Positive “Former President Bill Clinton, who was appointed special envoy to Haiti for the United Nations well before the earthquake, has written an essay for Time magazine called “[What Haiti Needs](#).” Mr. Clinton’s essay concludes on this optimistic note: Haiti isn’t doomed. Let’s not forget, the damage from the earthquake is largely concentrated in the Port-au-Prince area. That has meant a tragic loss of life, but it also means there are opportunities to rebuild in other parts of the island.”

But how the aid would be distributed remained a question. “To know where to take it and to know where to hand it over safely, that’s one of the big issues that humanitarian agencies have,” he said. “If we’re not going to be getting the aid out in a hurry, it has to be taken out of the aircraft, and it needs to be stored.” Mr. Castro said that although the United States Army was controlling the ground operations, he was concerned about security. “Security is going to be an issue over the next few days,” he said.”

“But Richard Dubin, the vice president of Haiti Shipping Lines, based in Miami, said Cap Haitien could handle only a third of the volume of Port-au-Prince.

“I think it’s going to be worse than anyone still understands,” he said. ”

Positive “The United Nations secretary general, [Ban Ki-moon](#), described another “small miracle during a night which brought few other miracles.” An Estonian bodyguard named Tarmo Joveer was recovered, virtually unscathed, from beneath 13 feet of debris at the United Nations offices at the Christopher Hotel on Thursday morning, where 100 more of the organization’s workers remained buried inside. Rescuers found him with the help of electronic sensors and dogs brought in by the American, Chinese and French teams, and had helped keep him alive by piping him water through a tube.”

His wife and three children lived in Haiti, and he had heard nothing since the quake struck two days before. There was nothing left to do but go there.”

His aunt and a 7-year-old nephew are missing. “There are a lot of people who didn’t make it out of the hotel,” Mr. Cardozo said grimly. “I am here, and I am fortunate to be in a situation where I can help the country with my work.”

There was a stiff formality among them, in their use of French, their bearing, their sheltered lives in the hills overlooking the slums. And even with the increasing stability under Mr. Préval, the country’s dozens of political parties remained as raucous as ever, turning Parliament into a form of political theater. A series of prime ministers, named by the president, had been sacked by the legislature in what most observers considered an excessive exercise of its power.”

Delatour “This is bad today, but one must remember that we have the historical memory of slavery here,” he said. “What can be worse than that?”

“The Associated Press reports that the U.N. said on Saturday “the body of Haiti mission chief Hédi Annabi has been found in the rubble of collapsed headquarters. Mr. Annabi had been missing since the collapse of the Hotel Christopher, the headquarters of United Nations mission in Haiti on Tuesday”

“One of MSF’s Operational Coordinators in Port au Prince, Hans van Dillen, says there was an immediate reaction when people found out that we were starting medical activities in Carrefour. People began crowding around the entrance. Patients are being brought in on wheelbarrows and carried on people’s backs. There are other hospitals in the area but they are already overflowing with injured people and have limited numbers of Haitian staff or supplies.”

Importância Americana “F.A.A. is managing air traffic management into Haitian airspace, and the United States Air Force is running operations on the ground. Haitian

air traffic controllers are talking to planes while they are in the air en route and up until they land.”

Empathy “Jean is one of 60 students at Haiti’s only film school, the Ciné Institute in Jacmel. The 7.0 earthquake destroyed the school but miraculously left all but one of the students alive and accounted for. The next day, they returned to the rubble that had been their classroom and found much of their equipment destroyed. But they unearthed six small video cameras and one still camera, enabling them to get to work.”

“On Friday, an Australian television news crew helped to rescue a 16-month-old girl from the ruins of a destroyed house in Haiti.”

“In a disaster this huge, television reporters are the heralds of the fund-raising effort. News organizations repeatedly let people know how and where to donate money for Haiti, and those reminders allow Americans to feel that they can do something useful. They also help television news organizations by reminding viewers — and earthquake victims — that journalists serve as a pillar of the rescue mission, on the scene to do more than just gather information.”

On Thursday night Dr. [Sanjay Gupta](#), CNN's chief medical correspondent, led a camera crew through one of the few remaining hospitals in the region. As he passed wounded and dying victims, he explained that there were no doctors or nurses there to treat them. But CNN made a point of repeatedly showing another scene in which Dr. Gupta ran through the street to minister to an infant, the camera lingering on him as he cradled her in his arms and examined her head for lacerations.

Repetition has its place in a frightening emergency; images shown over and over — be it 9/11, the 2004 tsunami or [Hurricane Katrina](#) — magnify an event but can also inure the viewer. A joyous reunion of mother and child helps defuse the bracketing tragedy. But too much repetition can backfire when it looks like promotional material. The line between compassion and self-congratulation is thin on television; in a calamity this vast and acute, many viewers flinch at any sign of reportorial showboating.

And this earthquake has its own rules. Usually television is accused of overselling a crisis. The cameras zoom in on a hurricane, a riot or a guerrilla battle, magnifying the most dramatic images and cropping out people walking to work or hanging laundry in the near distance.

The Haiti story doesn't need hyping; if anything, television understates the horror by balancing harrowing sights with miniature portraits of hope.

The NBC weatherman [Al Roker](#) returned from Haiti to the "Today" show on Friday, and Mr. Roker, the usually jolly co-host, didn't have too much to say. The situation is "awful," he said. "The pictures almost can't convey what's going on down there."

“Officials strain to distribute...”

Intervenção americana “Secretary of State [Hillary Rodham Clinton](#) arrived in Port-au-Prince, met with President [René Prével](#) for an hour and assured Haitians that the United States “will be here today, tomorrow and for the time ahead.” And in Washington, [President Obama](#) stood with former Presidents [George W. Bush](#) and [Bill Clinton](#), who will lead a national drive to raise money to help the survivors.”

Even as the United States took a leading role in aid efforts, some aid officials were describing misplaced priorities, accusing United States officials of focusing their efforts on getting their people and troops installed and lifting their citizens out. Under agreement with Haiti, the United States is now managing air traffic control at the airport, helicopters are flying relief missions from warships off the coast and 9,000 to 10,000 troops are expected to arrive by Monday to help with the relief effort.

CRITICA “There are 200 flights going in and out every day, which is an incredible amount for a country like Haiti,” said Jarry Emmanuel, the air logistics officer for the agency’s Haiti effort. “But most of those flights are for the United States military. He added: “Their priorities are to secure the country. Ours are to feed. We have got to get those priorities in sync.”

The United States Agency for International Development was helping choose sites and clear roads for 14 centers for the distribution of food and water. Rajiv Shah, the agency’s administrator, said the United States had moved \$48 million of food supplies from Texas since the quake and distributed 600,000 packaged meals. It has also installed three water-purification systems capable of purifying 100,000 liters a day. Yet problems remain. American officials said that 180 tons of relief supplies had been delivered to the airport, but much was still waiting for delivery. While the military has cleared other landing sites for helicopters around the capital, they are thronged by people looking for help, making landings hazardous.

Some aid workers were critical of the United Nations, as well, arguing that the agency had the most on-the-ground experience in Haiti and should be directing efforts better.

Michel Chancy, appointed by Mr. Prével to coordinate relief, said that much of the aid to Haiti was coming to a government that was itself under siege.

“The palace fell,” he said. “Ministries fell. And not only that, the homes of many ministers fell. The police were not coming to work. Relief agencies collapsed. The U.N. collapsed. It was hard to get ourselves in a place where we could help others.”

“We’re all going crazy,” said Nan Buzard, senior director of international response and programs for the [American Red Cross](#). “You don’t have any kind of orderly distributions of food, water, shelter, clothing. The planes are in the air, the materials are purchased. It remains a profoundly frustrating situation for everyone.”

Violência cresce “Jean-Mario Mondésur, 41, a bookkeeper, wandered by the street, Boulevard Jean-Jacques Dessalines, to join the crowd of onlookers. Minutes later, he had seen enough. “There are bad men here, we must run!” he shouted.”

Fights broke out as crowds of people scrambled to collect rolls of fabric, sauce pans and other items that were tossed into the streets. In some cases, men pulled out knives or brandished chunks of wood to try to disperse the crowds and take the loot for themselves. Guns were fired.

Empathy “We are all in a bad way,” said Margaret Cherubin, 41, a merchant who lost her husband, Jimmy, and three children in the earthquake. She said she was afraid to return to work because of her fear of thieves. “I have no family, just the clothing on my back,” she said. “I now live with God only.”

There were also reports of attacks on aid deliveries. Fred Lavaud, who works on the security detail of [Haiti](#)’s president, [René Préval](#), described scenes of women who were assaulted after receiving food. “The problem is there’s no control,” he said. “And people are desperate.”

The mob stripped the accused looter, then began beating him. They dragged him up the street while pummeling him, then threw him on a trash heap, where he lay vomiting and bleeding. One man began piling trash on top of him and set it on fire. As the firelight flickered on an art gallery and a church on opposite sides of the street, dozens gathered to watch the man burn to death.

In a notice this weekend, the Federal Aviation Administration said priority would be given to search and rescue, military and humanitarian aircraft, in that order. Flights are being routed through a command center at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida and pilots must tell controllers what they have on board and when they would like to arrive.

American troops have taken control of the airport at Port-au-Prince, the Haitian capital, and are helping to provide security for the enormous international relief effort. A steady stream of administration officials have headed south, from Secretary of State [Hillary Rodham Clinton](#) — who cut short a trip to the South Pacific, rushed home, and then flew to Haiti on Saturday — to one of Mr. Obama’s closest aides, Denis R. McDonough, the [National Security Council](#)’s chief of staff.

“We will be here today, tomorrow, and for the time ahead,” Mrs. Clinton said to Haitian journalists in Port-au-Prince, standing alongside President [René Préval](#).

With so many others in the Haitian government [missing or dead](#), the Obama administration is already facing questions of whether the United States is the only entity capable of bringing order to Port-au-Prince. Beyond that is the question of whether Mr. Obama can handle Haiti at a time when he is already grappling with wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

“The state is broken, the people are broken, but it is time to mobilize,” said Tirone Joël, 24, a psychology student. “We can sit back and wait for help from our friends abroad, or we can use our own talents and take charge of one little corner of this situation.”

“The threat of mass looting seems to increase by the day. And the police here have long been outmatched by criminal gangs in money and guns. Inspector Thelemarque Dielph was resigned to accepting help from abroad.”

“Trash collection is another example. Before the earthquake, it had been one of the government’s bright spots. Large plastic bins in most neighborhoods were emptied with little difficulty weekly, or daily in some places. These days, the government contractor in charge of some waste collection has become the main resource for collecting dead bodies; city garbage trucks appear only sporadically to clear the refuse.”

Empathy “I was here and suffer the consequences of this earthquake in my soul,” the principal, Francesca Polycarpe, said. “These girls were my charges. I am so depressed. But I have to salvage what I can. I have to lift myself out of my own misery because maybe, maybe, there is a future for our Haitian schools.”

“For the seriously ill, the chances of surviving may depend on leaving Haiti entirely. On Wednesday morning, a paramedic rushed up to Dr. de Marchena with news of a newborn who had arrived at another clinic in dire condition. After hearing that the baby could barely breathe, Dr. de Marchena said, “Should I get him airlifted to the United States?” The paramedic hesitated for a moment, and the doctor said, “Do it.” The baby was soon boarded for medical care in Miami.”

“Another grievance among some health professionals was that the American military was not giving enough of a priority to humanitarian aid. [Doctors Without Borders](#) has complained that more than one of its planes carrying vital medical equipment has been kept from landing at the airport here, costing lives.”

“Despite all the incoming help, Partners in Health, an organization that has been providing health care in Haiti for two decades, estimated that 20,000 Haitians were dying daily from lack of surgery.”

One of the keys to bolstering the response, said Dr. [Paul Farmer](#), a co-founder of [Partners in Health](#) and deputy [United Nations](#) envoy to Haiti, was to unify the disparate aid efforts. “Everyone’s doing their own thing, and we need to bring them together,” he said in an interview.

Empathy ““Look, it’s not going to be easy because they’re traumatized themselves,” he said of his students. “I myself am a psychologist who needs therapy. When I go to sleep, I dream of houses falling down.”

“I would say there’s no hate, but there’s no interaction,” said Lazer Gross, a retired businessman who was one of a group of Hasidic men who helped provide money to send a team of 25 people from Spring Valley to [Haiti](#) on Wednesday. “We have different lifestyles and cultures. But the willingness is there. We don’t have to be in a fighting mode, where the attitude is ‘Whatever you do for me is no good and whatever I do for you is no good.’ I think that’s changing.”

Empathy “When you watch on television, you just feel paralyzed; I just felt I had to be there,” said one team member, Barbara Augustin, an emergency room nurse at Nyack Hospital who moved to the United States from Haiti 10 years ago at 19. “I can’t sleep, thinking about what’s going on. So it will be very difficult there, but my biggest fear would be not being able to do anything.”

Positive “David Bowlby, who is in the stucco business in Guilford, Conn., and travels regularly to Haiti with his Feed Them Ministries, which helps feed more than 4,000 children daily, said he hoped that something positive could come out of such suffering. “Disaster brings people together,” he said. “Haiti had nothing to offer the world — no gold, no oil, nothing of monetary value. Now at least it has the world’s attention.”

Bringing Haitians and Hasidim together for the long haul here will take more than one disaster far away. They are often at odds over Hasidic control of the school board in a district where the Jews send their children to yeshivas. There are frequent battles over zoning and density and development, and very few opportunities to share each other’s largely private, very religious and often ritualized cultures. Still, about two dozen

Perhaps worst of all, relief efforts in the field are sometimes competitive with little collaboration between agencies, including smaller, grass-roots charities that may have better networks in affected counties and so are well placed to immediately implement emergency relief.”

The devastation in [Haiti](#) has, in the words of the [Pew Research Center](#), dominated the “public’s consciousness” in a way that few international disasters ever have. Dozens of television channels showed a celebrity telethon on Friday, raising at least \$57 million. The attention has come in large part because of the news media’s reportorial muscle, the kind that is harder to flex in a challenging economic climate.

Three narratives quickly took shape: the sheer number of dead; the overwhelming number of injured; and the delays in reaching survivors with aid. Journalists with medical experience found themselves pressed into performing surgery, often with the cameras rolling.

“The Pew Research Center found last week that 60 percent of Americans were following news about the earthquake closely, mostly through TV newscasts. “This is a picture story, to a very large degree,” said Andrew Kohut, the president of the Pew Research Center.”

Occasionally the pictures have created controversy. Graphic photos of dead bodies on the front pages of newspapers offended some subscribers, who made their disapproval known to [The Times’s public editor](#) and [The Washington Post’s ombudsman](#). In columns on Sunday, both men said the newspapers were right to display the unsettling photos. News outlets also faced questions about the balancing act between passively documenting the conditions in Haiti and actively helping survivors. After The Associated Press wrote about a nursing home near the Port-au-Prince airport, readers asked whether the reporter, Alfred de Montesquiou, had tried to help the dying residents.

Mr. Cooper and Dr. Gupta decided over the weekend to stay in Haiti for another week. “I can’t really imagine going home,” Mr. Cooper wrote on Twitter on Saturday morning. He expressed almost the same sentiment after Katrina. “Stories like this are very good at reminding people about why we got into this business,” Mr. Maddox said.

The region’s seismic activity is due to the movement of the Caribbean tectonic plate, which can be likened to a finger pushing its way against two larger plates, the North American and South American. Along the boundaries, the relative eastward movement of the Caribbean plate, at the rate of less than an inch a year, creates strike-slip faults, shallow fissures whose sides slide in relation to one another in an earthquake.

Negative “That raises the possibility that the Jan. 12 earthquake could be the beginning of a new sequence occurring over decades, with each successive quake redistributing stresses along the fault. “It’s certainly possible and it’s really something we’re very concerned about,” said Carol S. Prentice, a geologist with the geological survey in Menlo Park. Such sequences have been observed on other faults, including the North Anatolian in Turkey.”

“They know they’ve been destroyed twice,” he said. “They know their construction is not the best. All those things have put the whole country on edge.

On the other extreme, minimalists fervently believe that years of failed, foreign-imposed aid projects underscore that this time Haitians need to develop and implement their own plans.

CRITICA “The disappointment in the president seems most palpable. Judith Marceline, a former nurse who lost everything in the quake but the dirty flowered dress she was wearing Sunday, said that she stood in line for hours to vote for Mr. Préval in 2006. Today she wonders why. “When he needed us, we went out to support him,” she said. “Now that we need him, where is he?”

“To those who have suggested that the recovery ought to be moving more quickly, he said, “They underestimate the magnitude of the problem.” And when asked for a political forecast, he sounded more hopeful than sure, saying that he would try to push ahead with the presidential election, scheduled for November, as the best way to guarantee political stability. “I want this to be a new country,” he said, waving his hands for emphasis. “I want it to be totally different.”

The federal government announced on Monday that it would reimburse American hospitals who treat Haitian [earthquake](#) victims with life-threatening injuries, making it possible for more hospitals in states outside Florida to consider taking those patients.

A statement jointly issued by the [Department of Health and Human Services](#) and [USAID](#), the agency coordinating the American response, said both agencies had activated a program that allows American hospitals to take patients with injuries too grave to be treated in the devastation of Haiti and be repaid by the federal government at 110 percent of the rates paid for [Medicare](#) patients.

The White House, acutely aware of the lessons from Hurricane Katrina, stepped in to resolve the problem. Thomas E. In New York, which has more Haitians than any other American city, the population has pulled together to help the homeland in past natural disasters or political upheavals, and to organize in response to AIDS. But those coalitions, many say, must be reinvented with each new crisis.

“We have a great capacity to mobilize at any moment, but we don’t have a great capacity to institutionalize,” Ms. Charles said. “We don’t have organizations that are long-lasting. We don’t have the ability to create a pool of resources.”

“We’re so focused on fitting in and assimilating and moving away from the community,” said Ms. Fleurimond, 28, who immigrated at age 7 and graduated from [Columbia University](#). “We succeed as individuals, not so much as a community.”

The main problem, she said, is a lack of fresh leaders to replace those who have stepped down or returned to Haiti. “When the old people retired, they did not designate any successors,” she said. Though Haitians have not wanted for troubles to address — from the violent dictatorship of François Duvalier, beginning in the 1950s, to the destructive storms of 2008 — the succession of crises has led to a kind of leadership fatigue, said François Pierre-Louis Jr., an associate professor of political science at [Queens College](#), who immigrated from Haiti in 1974.

At a fly-infested clinic hastily erected alongside the rubble of the only tuberculosis sanatorium in this country, Pierre-Louis Monfort is a lonely man in a crowded room. [Haiti](#) has the [highest tuberculosis rate](#) in the Americas, and health experts say it is about to drastically increase.

Empathy ““I’m drowning,” said Mr. Monfort, 52, flanked by a line of people waiting for pills as he emptied a bedpan full of blood. All of the hospital’s 50 other nurses and 20 doctors died in the earthquake or have refused to return to work out of fear for the building’s safety or preoccupation with their own problems, he said. Mr. Monfort joked that the earthquake had earned him a promotion from a staff nurse at the sanatorium to its new executive director.”

Mr. Monfort began to explain that his biggest problem was a lack of food. Suddenly a huge crash shook the clinic. A patient screamed. Everyone stood still, eyes darting. A man outside yelled that another section of the hospital had collapsed. People looking for materials to build huts had pulled wood pilings from a section of the hospital roof, which then fell as the scavengers leapt to safety, the man said.

At the Champ de Mars, Jean-Baptiste Renauld sat on a curb, one shoe missing, his blue polo shirt torn, his head cupped in his hands. “I have TB, and I am also supposed to get dialysis every other day,” he said, explaining that he was a doctor’s assistant before the earthquake and meticulous about his treatments. “I have not had dialysis in three weeks, and I feel my blood is rotting from inside.”

“Why don’t you just leave us to die?” asked Clervil Orange, 39. Mr. Monfort looked offended by the notion. But he did not answer and the question seemed to stick with him.

“On Religion...”

Crude and harsh as Mr. Robertson’s words were, he deserved a perverse kind of credit for one thing. He actually did recognize the centrality of voodoo to Haiti. In the voluminous media coverage of the quake and its aftermath, relatively few journalists and commentators have done so, and even fewer have gotten voodoo right.

“The media has reported a lot about voodoo but not much of it very insightful or intelligent,” said [Diane Winston](#), a professor of religion and media at the [University of Southern California](#). “Voodoo is one of those flashpoints for Americans because it’s exotic, unknown and has strange connotations. It may be a matter of underlying racism because voodoo is African and Caribbean in its origins, or because voodoo seems so different from Christianity that it’s the perfect Other.” [Prof. Leslie G. Desmangles](#) of Trinity College in Hartford, who is the author of several scholarly and reference books about voodoo, views these current caricatures of voodoo as all too familiar. “There’s been a very degrading, derogatory language about voodoo,” he said in a recent interview. “It’s language that goes back to the 19th century.”

The occupation of Haiti by American military forces from 1915 until 1934 introduced a cartoonish version of voodoo enduringly into pop culture. The 1929 book “Magic Island,” by a Briton, W. B. Seabrook, became a best seller in the United States. While Mr. Seabrook was arguably enlightened for his time, the commercial success of his book inspired an array of B-movies in the 1930s and 1940s, like “White Zombie.”

In American political rhetoric, “voodoo” functions as a synonym for “fraudulent,” going back to George Bush’s description of [supply-side economics](#). Would any public figure dare use “Baptist” or “Hindu” or “Hasidic” in the same way?

But Catholicism in Haiti, as too few journalists seemed to realize, is not more or less like Catholicism in a Polish parish in Chicago or an Irish one in Boston. It is a Catholicism in symbiosis with voodoo, a Catholicism in which saints are conflated with African deities and dead ancestors serve as interlocutors between God and humanity.

Negative ““[Haiti](#)’s pigs live better lives than we do,” said Dora Nadege, 28, as she wandered back to her tent camp in Place St.-Pierre from a ravine on the camp’s edge, where its hundreds of inhabitants relieve themselves throughout the day in the open air. “When the rains come, we’ll be lucky not to drown in our own excrement,” said Ms. Nadege, a mother of four, who sold bread on the street before the earthquake.”

The human waste problem was daunting even before the earthquake. Lacking a municipal sewage system, many families here employ a socially scorned class of nocturnal latrine cleaners known in Creole as the “bayakou.” They descend into latrines to clean excrement with their hands, before transporting it in carts to improvised disposal sites.

“The real culprit right now is the flies, which become vectors by taking fecal waste from one place to another,” said Dr. Redfield, who got sick himself with [salmonella](#) typhi while working in Haiti this month. “This means you can control what you eat and still get something,” he said. “The arrival of the rains could make [malaria](#) and dengue more problematic as well.”

The Haitian Creole term for children who are sent to other families is “restavek,” which is derived from the French words “rester avec,” or “stay with.” But critics of the restavek system say that it is closer to child slavery than any kind of foster care because many of the children are forced to engage in back-breaking work in return for their upkeep.

In 2007, Unicef reported that “an estimated 173,000 Haitian children” lived as restaveks. The U.N. agency noted that this number represented “over 8 percent of children between 5 and 17 years of age” in Haiti.

ON Jan. 13, the day after the [earthquake](#) that upended Haiti, Garry Pierre-Pierre, editor and publisher of [The Haitian Times](#), moved the center of operations for his weekly newspaper from Brooklyn to a tent in the backyard of a damaged apartment building in Port-au-Prince. If he was going to cover one of the most transformative events in the history of the country and its diaspora, he knew there was only one place for him to be.

It is no surprise that The Times and New York’s three other weekly Haitian newspapers, [Haiti Liberté](#), [Haiti Observateur](#) and [Haiti Progres](#), have been dominated by stories about the disaster. But many of the hundreds of other ethnic newspapers in New York — like the daily Novoye Russkoye Slovo, a Russian paper, and El Tiempo de New York, a Hispanic weekly — have run stories revealing particular perspectives on the earthquake and its aftermath. The weekly Peruanisimo News, for example, reported on a fund-raiser for Haiti in Paterson, N.J. The fund-raiser was organized by Peruvians, and Paterson is a stronghold of the Peruvian population in the region. The New York Carib News wrote about post-earthquake psychological counseling for Caribbean vendors on Flatbush Avenue, supplied by a Brooklyn hospital and a Caribbean-American business group. And Thikana, a Bangladeshi weekly based in Long Island City, Queens, exhorted Bangladeshis in the United States and elsewhere in the world to donate generously to relief efforts.

That means Catholic school and college. Mrs. Lajoie is determined to treat them the same as her children.

Those who make it to Haiti often worry that with no central clearinghouse matching supplies and staff to needs, their efforts may not be having the greatest impact. And they worry that their new dedication will get lost in the shuffle in a multibillion-dollar reconstruction effort dominated by non-Haitian agencies and governments. Ms. Toussaint is among those ambivalent volunteers. After a frantic struggle to find a way to volunteer -- and several false starts when large relief organizations did not return her

“A pediatric nurse used to working with sophisticated neonatal intensive-care equipment at Harlem Hospital Center, she found herself in the ruins of Haiti's general university hospital, trying to treat children with crushed limbs and breathing trouble, but lacking adequate anesthetics, sterile equipment or clear lines of hospital authority. "What we were doing, it's not enough, it wasn't enough," she said recently, in a restaurant across from Harlem Hospital Center. She wonders how Haitians will get enough food and shelter, let alone reform health care. "It's a mess -- you don't know who's going to take the lead.”

“Dr. Nelson, who is in his 50s, had long dreamed of saving up to open twin medical clinics in Haiti, one for paying customers, one for the poor. (He never got his United States medical license, starting a home health care business instead.) But in recent years he had given up on the idea, and went to Haiti only for the occasional funeral. "Every time you go, you come back so full of despair," he said. "You think it can't go back any further, but every time it's worse.”

Fontus stamped her feet and flapped her arms. She sobbed, and no amount of consoling could calm her. Her mother, Issionese Fontus, had gone to the little teal-trimmed church for a Bible-reading session. It took her daughter a full day to pick through the debris-strewn streets to reach the church, where she fears her mother will be entombed.

Mivesa Antoine huddled with three sons -- ages 3, 5 and 10 -- and what was now the sum total of his worldly possessions: one plate, one spoon, one cup and half a bag of rice.

Obama, flanked by Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates and Vice President Biden, said the rescue of Haiti's people,

as well as the nation's long-term recovery, is a top U.S. priority. The U.S. military now has a 24-hour-a-day airlift underway. The White House said a large shipment of food will arrive Saturday. Three U.S. military helicopters were scheduled to fly in Thursday from the neighboring Dominican Republic loaded with water, medical supplies, hardware and personnel. They are prepared to return to the Dominican Republic with some of the injured.”

The fear of violating the victim's privacy -- which is a strange and dubious scruple -- isn't in operation in Haiti. After years of hinting at horror, the scales have fallen, the camera is unsheathed as a seemingly transparent window on misery, and journalists are allowed to show the worst, and say with the blunt, desperate urgency of the best journalism: Look.

What's changed? There are obvious answers: The slow numbing effect of the past decade, which also included devastating images [from New Orleans](#) and [Sichuan, China](#), may simply have lowered the threshold of what is acceptable to show. The easy availability of the most graphic photographs and videos online may have changed the equation for everyone. There also seems to be a self-lacerating, guilt-ridden quality to the graphic coverage, as if the Western media are indicting both themselves and the larger Western indifference to the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere.

CRITICA More than anything else, however, the willingness to look this disaster square on reflects the problematic, even embarrassing status of Haiti. It was a country tossed aside, seemingly consigned to the status of a street person whose needs are intractable. There were, of course, years of engagement and disengagement, as the United States and countries from around the hemisphere intervened (often disastrously) in Haitian politics. There were U.N. resolutions, peacekeepers and aid efforts. But with devastating hurricanes, a failed political system, corruption, coups and riots, Haiti became the very definition of a failed state. To be blunt: It came to seem as if the people of Haiti had no status.

Questions and answers were sent back and forth, and soon, Santos said, "they started cutting away concrete." For the trapped group, weariness and despair were replaced with elation. "We knew we were going to be rescued," Santos said.

President Obama has declared that the United States will not forsake Haiti in its moment of agony. Honoring this commitment would be a first for Washington. To prevent a deepening spiral of death, the United States will have to do things differently than in the past. American relief and development institutions do not function properly, and to believe otherwise would be to condemn Haiti's poor and dying to our own mythology.

In Haiti, we are facing not only a horrific natural disaster but the tectonics of nature, poverty and politics. Even before [last week's earthquake](#), roughly half of the nation's 10 million inhabitants lived in destitution, in squalid housing built of adobe or masonry without reinforcements, perched precariously on hillsides. The country is still trying to recover from the [hurricanes of 2008](#) as well as longtime social and political traumas. The government's inability to cope has been obvious, but those of us who have been around Haiti for many years also know about the lofty international promises that follow each disaster -- and how ineffectual the response has been each time.

CRITICA In the past two decades, U.S. interventions have done much more harm than good to the Haitian economy. In the early 1990s, Washington thought it did Haiti a favor by imposing a crushing trade embargo to bring about democratization -- specifically, the reinstatement of democratically elected President Jean-Bertrand Aristide. The embargo destroyed Haiti's fragile manufacturing industries.

CRITICA Haiti will suffer a quick death of hunger and disease unless we act, and the United States will suffer a slow and painful moral death unless we respond to the extreme distress of our neighbors, whom we have neglected for so long and, at times, even put in harm's way.

The question is, what will happen in two months? Two years? "I worry that when the cameras go away, you know, people will start looking away. Right now it's a dramatic story. It's Haiti on its knees," said Edwidge Danticat, a Haitian-born author who lives in Miami and has been anxiously waiting for news from her relatives.

CRITICA Americans care about Haiti -- but how much they care and whether they will care in the months and years to come are questions that can only be answered with the passage of time. Amy Wilentz, a journalist who has written extensively about Haiti, takes a jaundiced view: "We only like them when they're dying. That's when we care."

Perhaps this catastrophe is so big that it will permanently transform the relationship between Americans and Haitians. Not all disasters are created equal. On television we see Haitians clambering over bodies and coping with the intensifying stench of corpses. We see bodies buried in makeshift landfills without so much as an identifying snapshot. It's like Hurricane Katrina, only much worse. So it was, Sunday morning, that compassion arrived at the Haitian embassy in Washington -- and pretty much inundated it. Word had spread on the Internet that the Greater Washington Haiti Relief Committee needed donations of clothes, medicine, batteries, diapers, baby formula and so on. The start time was set for 11 a.m., but people began showing up at the embassy on Massachusetts Avenue NW more than two hours in advance. By noon, the bags of donations had stuffed the old mansion to the rafters.

A coalition of relief organizations warned Sunday of a scam targeting Haitian Americans trying to transport relatives from the island after the devastating Jan. 12 earthquake.

And a man fried plantains in a pot of oil next to a woman on a blanket selling dented cans of peas and sardines.

Frustração "We were the goon squad when we were pushing people away and we still had food," said Sgt. Andy Anspach.

Haiti's government made an emotional appeal for more aid Monday, asking for food to feed 1.5 million people for 15 days, as international donors gathered for a conference here to attempt to organize an orderly path to recovery for the quake-devastated nation.

In Port-au-Prince, the Haitian government confirmed the death toll at 112,250 and rising, with an additional 194,000 people injured. Lewis Lucke, the U.S. special coordinator for relief and reconstruction in Haiti, said the estimated number of homeless had climbed to 800,000.

Negativo “The day-to-day functioning of government remains disrupted. The Haitian government lost so many of its buildings that it is now camped at a federal police facility formerly occupied by its SWAT team. Meetings with top Haitian officials take place under a tree. United Nations officials have been given permission to politely

decline to attend meetings in Haitian government buildings they deem too unstable to stand the continuing aftershocks.”

Ajuda internacional “In Montreal, foreign donors agreed that any nation seeking to help rebuild Haiti should make a commitment of at least 10 years to the cause. The prime minister acknowledged that his country still had no estimates of how much foreign aid ultimately would be needed.”

Mindful of the possible scope of the rebuilding, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton announced that the United States will host a donors' conference in March, to be held at the United Nations' headquarters. She said the key donors -- led by the United States, Canada, Brazil, the European Union and France -- were trying the "novel idea" of conducting a needs-assessment study before planning and then raising the necessary funds.

Negativo Haiti was already the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, but "in 30 seconds, Haiti lost 60 percent" of its gross domestic product, he said.

The United States initially promised \$100 million to deal with the humanitarian crisis in Haiti, and Clinton said Monday that "there will be more to come."

Emotional “They included a 7-year-old girl with burns on 30 percent of her body. A boy brought in Friday afternoon had a pulmonary embolism and needed oxygen as he

gasped for air. One patient was missing both legs and his right arm; at least one of his fingers had been amputated. Children young enough for baby carriages and building blocks were missing limbs and parts of their heads.”

Reports show that violence against women and girls was already common in Haiti before the earthquake. In a 2006 study by the Inter-American Development Bank, one-third of women and girls said they had suffered physical or sexual violence, and more than half of those were younger than 18.

Her father, Stefan Senat, 23, said she had an eye infection and was getting too sick to cry. Even if she did, Petithomme said, "the milk is not enough for the baby because I feel weak myself.”

Emotional “Scott P. Lewis, who brought a team of volunteers from West Palm Beach, Fla., oversaw a delivery of 60 tons of dried food and cooking oil near the presidential palace. Thousands of people lined up and, as the supplies diminished, panicked and rushed the bags, tearing them open in a frenzy. Peacekeepers used tear gas."That's human suffering. It's desperation, and it's understandable," said Lewis, president of the Eagles Wings Foundation, a small nonprofit organization. He said the U.S. military, which has 4,400 soldiers on the ground in Haiti, must become more involved.”

Positivo “Perhaps the most successful food operation in the capital took place this week on a once exclusive golf course in the hills east of the crippled downtown. Catholic Relief Services teamed with soldiers from the U.S. Army's 82nd Airborne Division to distribute more than 200 tons of food, principally lentils and bulgar, to about 6,500 families.”

ELOGIO Donal Reilly "With the American soldiers here, it's easy. We're looking at further cooperation with them," Reilly said. "It's a good lesson learned from what needs to happen."

Many were the leaders of Cite Soleil gangs, which act as armies of intimidation; they work for the business elite and politicians, carrying out kidnappings, assassinations, extortion and political intimidation -- often for hire. They were deeply involved in drug trafficking.”

But help has its limits, U.S. officials emphasize in their public statements and in their interactions with Haitians. "You will have a friend and partner in the United States of America today and going forward," President Obama said the day after the earthquake.

ELOGIO "U.S. officials are doing what they can to bolster the stature of PrÃ©val and Prime Minister Jean-Max Bellerive and to promote international assistance efforts for the more-daunting work that lies ahead. In the meantime, they are deploying personnel

to support projects from food delivery to the erection of a temporary hospital near Port-au-Prince.”

ELOGIO “U.S. soldiers, whose numbers within Haiti have risen to 6,500, played a central role in Sunday's food distributions, working alongside U.N. peacekeepers to prevent the pushing, shoving and occasional melees that have severely hampered deliveries. Where U.S. troops have been present in recent days, relief workers say, deliveries have gone smoothly.”

CRITICA “The Haitian government has been here for a while, and they give us nothing. The United States should take over the country,” said Andrelita Laguerre, shepherding four children and a grandchild at the camp. “Most of my friends expect the United States to take over. I wish!”

One woman was paralyzed from the waist down; one kept having seizures five days after giving birth. “It is hard and sad,” he said. “You see kids who are malnourished. . . . I saw a 6-week-old who looked like a deformed dog, he was so tiny. It is overwhelming that people live like this.”

Normil is left with a 3-year-old girl, who rocked in her arms as she talked to a foreign visitor. “Some people blame me for what I did -- that I gave them away,” she explained. “But I gave them a better life.”

Soon after the quake, the Haitian government suspended new international adoptions to ensure that children said to be orphans were, in fact, orphaned. Relief agencies said that after a disaster, particularly one so merciless as the quake in Haiti, it is difficult to determine the status of unaccompanied children.

Doctors treating Haitians who needed advanced care in the United States reacted sharply, saying the government was leaving patients to die. Bruce Rueben, president of the Florida Hospital Association, was livid. “When you take

the entire state into consideration, we have ample capacity to help out," he said. "There never should have been a question. I was puzzled over where it came from," Rueben said. "It certainly didn't come from anyone on the ground that I knew. We had calls from hospitals saying 'How can we help out?'"

"Haiti is good for the United States, to show its humanitarian side," he said. "It's perfect for this administration, which is Democratic and liberal."

CRITICA "I just don't see this as a clear win for Washington," Birns said. "Everyone likes the idea of children being pulled from the rubble, but there isn't enough of that to counter the memories of the airport thing."

Many will need more surgery in coming months. They will also need physical therapy, occupational therapy and, in some cases, psychological counseling to cope with their disabilities.”

In any event, Haiti won't be starting from scratch when it shifts from short-term crisis management to long-term environmental planning. Although the 2008 storms were undoubtedly catastrophic, the quadruple-punch of Fay, Gustav, Hanna, and Ike energized attempts to revive the country's ecology and economy”

It's next to a deep loading dock filled with brown, scummy water.”
